

<p>Carolina Jessamine <i>Gelsemium sempervirens</i></p> <p><i>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</i></p>	<p>Grows 15-20 feet</p>	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 20 degrees</p>	<p>Shiny, light green leaves. Trumpet-shaped yellow flowers in spring. Usually deer-resistant.</p>	
<p>Star Jasmine <i>Trachelospermum jasminoides</i></p>	<p>Grows 15-20 feet</p> <p>*Yellow Star Jasmine blooms light yellow and handles colder temperatures (to around 5 degrees)</p>	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 20 degrees</p>	<p>Trailing, dark green leaves and fragrant, white flowers in summer. Takes sun or some shade. May burn in cold temps.</p>	 <p>© Robert Perry</p>
<p>Madame Galen Trumpet Vine <i>Campsis x tagliabuana 'Madame Galen'</i></p> 	<p>Grows 15-25 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 30 degrees</p>	<p>Green leaves and showy orange/red trumpet-shaped flowers in summer and fall. Loved by hummingbirds and other pollinators.</p>	

<p>Clematis Vine <i>Clematis</i></p>	<p>Grows 20-30 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 20 degrees</p>	<p>Green leaves and large, showy flowers in spring. May repeat bloom. Flowers can be purple, pink, or white.</p>	
<p>Honeysuckle Vine <i>Lonicera</i></p> 	<p>Grows 20-30 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Dark green to blue-green leaves. Elongated, sweet-smelling flowers in late spring. Loved by hummingbirds. Flowers can be pink, white, purple, or yellow.</p>	




<p>Wisteria Vine <i>Wisteria</i></p> 	<p>Grows 25-30 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Feather shaped, green, elongated leaves. Cascades of blue to purple flowers in spring. May repeat bloom.</p>	
<p>Boston Ivy <i>Parthenocissus tricuspidate</i></p> <p>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</p>	<p>Grows 30-50 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 40 degrees</p>	<p>A true climber. Green, three-lobed leaves resemble poison ivy. Leaves turn brilliant orange-red in fall. Insignificant greenish-white flowers. A favorite for showy fall color.</p>	
<p>Virginia Creeper <i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i></p> <p>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</p>	<p>Grows 30-50 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 40 degrees</p>	<p>Similar to Boston Ivy, but with leaves of five. Turns brilliant red and purple in fall. Can grow on a variety of surfaces as it can fasten to bark and even rock.</p>	



→ this symbol indicates plants that can survive drought once established. It takes 1-2 years of regular watering for a plant to be fully established. In general, plants will look better with regular water, but drought-tolerant plants can survive times when water is not available.

<p>California Honeysuckle <i>Lonicera hispidula</i></p> 	<p>Grows 10-20 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Green leaves and unique flowers. Flowers are yellowish at base with pink 'fingers'. Flowers are loved by hummingbirds. Red berries are edible but bitter, and loved by birds.</p> <p>Deer rating: 9/10</p>	
<p>California Wild Grape <i>Vitis californica</i></p> 	<p>Grows 20-30 feet</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 20 degrees</p>	<p>Large green leaves and twisted, woody vines. Leaves turn shades of orange, yellow, & red in fall. Clusters of small purple fruits are edible but often sour.</p> <p>Deer rating: 5/10 *needs protection until out of reach of deer</p>
