<p><b>Creeping Thyme</b> <i>Thymus</i> 'Elfin' or 'Reiter'</p>  	<p>1-3 inches tall 12-18 inches spread</p>	<p>Evergreen  Hardy to minus 10 degrees</p>	<p>Very low growing groundcover with tiny, fragrant green leaves. Small purple flowers in summer. Handles light foot traffic.</p>	
<p><b>Creeping Phlox</b> <i>Phlox subulata</i></p>  	<p>2-3 inches tall 3-4 feet spread</p>	<p>Evergreen  Hardy to minus 25 degrees</p>	<p>Showy spring flowers, usually around March and/or April. Flowers purple, pink, or pink-red.</p>	
<p><b>Spreading Germander</b> <i>Teucrium majoricum</i></p>  	<p>3-4 inches tall 3-4 feet spread</p>	<p>Evergreen  Hardy to 15 degrees</p>	<p>Long-blooming, early summer until a frost. Purple-pink blooms.</p>	










<p><b>Verbena</b> <i>Verbena</i></p> 	<p>3-4 inches tall 1-3 feet wide</p> 	<p>Semi-evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 20 degrees</p> <p><i>*some varieties are more cold hardy than others. We use 'Homestead' and 'Tapien' varieties the most.</i></p>	<p>Low-growing mat of green foliage gets covered with flowers. Long-blooming: blooms late spring through fall. May bloom purple, white, pink, or red.</p>	
<p><b>Sedum</b> <i>Stonecrop</i></p> 	<p>3-5 inches tall 2-3 feet wide <i>Can re-root in soil indefinitely</i></p> 	<p>Semi-evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 25 degrees</p>	<p>Succulent-like foliage may be green, blue, yellow, or red. Small flowers in fall are typically pink. <i>Some favorite varieties include Angelina, Dragon's Blood, &amp; Tricolor</i></p>	
<p><b>Periwinkle</b> <i>Vinca minor</i></p> 	<p>3-6 inches tall Continuously spreading</p> 	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 20 degrees</p>	<p>Trailing stems of smooth, green leaves. Blue-purple flowers in spring. Spreads continuously wherever there is water – can be difficult to stop spread.</p>	
<p><b>Snow In Summer</b> <i>Cerastium tomentosum</i></p> 	<p>4-6 inches tall 15-18 inches spread</p> 	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 40 degrees</p>	<p>Silvery-grey foliage forms nice low mat. Covered in pure white, star-like flowers in summer.</p>	



<p><b>Creeping Jenny</b> <i>Lysimachia nummularia</i></p> 	<p>4-8 inches tall Continually spreading</p> <p>*'Goldilocks' variety has bright chartreuse-yellow leaves but does best with some shade</p>	<p>Semi-evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 15 degrees (but goes deciduous in extreme cold)</p>	<p>Vigorous grower that re-roots itself and spreads to fill in an area. Low mat of rounded bright green leaves. Golden yellow flowers in late spring. <i>Foliage may burn in extreme heat and turn reddish in cold.</i></p>	
<p><b>Sundrops</b> <i>Calylophus drummondii</i></p> 	<p>6-8 inches tall 2-3 feet wide</p>	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Finely textured green foliage. Cupped, primrose yellow flowers cover the plant. Blooms mid-spring to mid-summer. May rebloom.</p>	
<p><b>Green Mound Juniper</b> <i>Juniperus 'Green Mound'</i></p> 	<p>6-12 inches tall 4-6 feet spread</p> <p>*there are also similar low-growing junipers that have <b>blue foliage</b> like Juniper wiltonii and Juniper 'Blue Rug'</p>	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 20 degrees</p>	<p>Dense, spreading, rug-like shrub. Attractive blueish-green needles take on purplish hue in fall. Blue berries from late spring to late winter.</p>	
<p><b>Lowfast Bearberry</b> <i>Cotoneaster dammeri 'Lowfast'</i></p>  	<p>10-12 inches tall 10-12 feet spread</p>	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to minus 10 degrees</p>	<p>Trailing stems of glossy, dark green leaves. White flowers in spring followed by bright red berries.</p>	



<p><b>St. Johns Wort</b> <i>Hypericum calycinum</i></p> 	<p>12-15 inches tall Continuously spreading</p>	<p>Evergreen <b>Hardy to minus 5 degrees</b></p>	<p>Elongated green to blue-green leaves. Attractive yellow flowers in summer. Spreads continuously wherever there is water – can be difficult to stop spread.</p>	
<p><b>Trailing Lantana</b> <i>Lantana montevidensis</i></p>  	<p>12-18 inches tall 3-5 feet spread</p>	<p>Evergreen <b>Hardy to 25 degrees</b></p>	<p>Very long-blooming. Lots of purple or white flowers from spring until a frost. <i>Needs winter protection above Sonora and in cold micro-climates.</i></p>	
<p><b>Creeping Rosemary</b> <i>Rosmarinus officinalis 'Prostratus'</i></p> 	<p>1-2 feet tall 5-6 feet spread</p>	<p>Evergreen <b>Hardy to 15 degrees</b></p>	<p>Aromatic green needle-like foliage. Lavender-blue flowers in winter and early spring.</p>	



→ this symbol indicates plants that can survive drought once established. It takes 1-2 years of regular watering for a plant to be fully established. In general, plants will look better with regular water, but drought-tolerant plants can survive times when water is not available.















→ this symbol indicates plants that are considered fire-wise, meaning that they are more resistant to wildfire due to their growth habits. Plants with this symbol were found online in lists of 'fire safe' plants.

<b>Common Lippia</b> <i>Phyla nodiflora</i> 	3-6 inches tall 2-3 feet wide 	Semi-evergreen Hardy to 5 degrees	Charming little heads of mauve-pink, lavender and white blossoms beginning in late spring. Long-blooming, loved by pollinators.	
<b>'Point Saint George'</b> <b>California Aster</b> <i>Aster 'Point Saint George'</i> 	4-6 inches tall 4-6 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Low growing perennial with shiny green leaves. Beautiful daisy-like lavender flowers with yellow center. Blooms summer and fall. Drought-tolerant once established.	
<b>Hearst California Lilac</b> <i>Ceanothus hearstiorum</i> 	6-12 inches tall 6-8 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Low, spreading shrub with oval, dark green leaves. Showy lilac flower spikes in spring. Flowers are loved by bees.	
<b>'Emerald Carpet'</b> <b>Manzanita</b> <i>Arctostaphylos 'Emerald Carpet'</i> 	10-16 inches tall 4-6 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 5 degrees	Low, spreading shrub with glossy green leaves. Small pink bell flowers in early spring. Drought-tolerant once established.	



<p><b>Spreading Sage</b>  <i>Salvia 'Bee's Bliss' or 'Dara's Choice'</i></p> 	<p>1-2 feet tall  4-6 feet wide</p> 	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 15 degrees</p>	<p>Low-growing perennial with green or grey-green leaves. Soft lavender-blue flower clusters in summer. Leaves and flowers are very aromatic. Drought-tolerant once established.</p>	
<p><b>Dwarf Coyote Bush</b>  <i>Baccharis 'Pigeon Point' or 'Twin Peaks'</i></p> 	<p>1-2 feet tall  6-8 feet wide</p> 	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 15 degrees</p>	<p>Spreading shrub with tiny, light green leaves. Insignificant cream flowers in spring. Drought-tolerant once established.</p>	
<p><b>Hancock Snowberry</b>  <i>Symphoricarpos x chenaultii 'Hancock'</i></p> 	<p>2-3 feet tall  5-8 feet wide</p> 	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to min15 degrees</p>	<p>Native hybrid with blue-green leaves and small coral berries in fall. Spreads quickly to cover ground and smother weeds. May need yearly trimming to keep low (can grow tall on its own).</p>
